## **Foci Descriptions:**

Examined Life and Human Experience: It is possible to know a lot about everything and still be ignorant of the most important matters. Who are we? What is meaningful and valuable? The Examined Life Focus is the purposeful study of the human experience, how people create and discuss meaning and value from experience, understand themselves and others, and develop empathy and insight into the human condition.

Faith and Culture: Students in the Faith and Culture Focus learn to understand and critically assess forms of cultural expression, discern social and cultural trends, and recognize the ways in which faith influences culture and vice -versa. Through the study of literature, art, music, history, and popular culture, students will experience life with more insight and learn to understand and influence culture from a perspective of faith.

Global Responsibility and Community Engagement: How do we become wise and do good in the world? Each person's perspective is limited, yet wisdom and goodness require reflection, empathy, and action drawn from the diverse experiences of others. The Global and Community Engagement Focus helps students understand the world from multiple perspectives, appreciate their inescapable involvement in global systems, and engage challenges to justice and living well in local communities and across the world.
