said "Crystal epitomizes motivation," Karen DeWitt Rachetta. Middle School Special Education Department & Committee Chairperson. Crystal Sessoms is a special education teacher at DeWitt. "She hopped on the fast track when she came to Ithaca City School District. I don't see her stopping any time soon. In four years, she has earned tenure, her master's degree, and her advance certificate for educational leadership. She not only seeks to accomplish her own goals, but inspires her students to accomplish theirs. She has completely immersed herself in our community through coaching, tutoring, and volunteering to help underrepresented students in our district."
